## **BUSINESS MEETING**

### **I. Introductions/Announcements**

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As Acting Chair, Maryanne Barnes called the meeting to order.

Ms. Barnes led introductions of the Council and audience present.

**Motion:** A motion was made to approve the October 23, 2013 minutes. The motion was seconded and passed.

**Motion:** A motion was made to accept the February 26, 2014 agenda. The motion was seconded and passed.

### **II. Department of Early Learning (DEL) Update**

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Kelli Bohanan, Assistant Director, Partnerships and Collaboration Division, gave an overview of Washington's state and local coordination projects for early learning.

Highlights:

- Strengthening Families:
  - February 24<sup>th</sup> in Olympia, parent recognition "Unsung Heroes"
  - Jermaine Raham's family received award
- Pinwheels for Prevention Campaign:
  - Begins in April
  - Second year – brought pinwheels to SICCC meeting last year
- Early Achievers:
  - One-third of licensed providers now in the Early Achievers program
- Legislative Updates:
  - HB 2282 – would add ten regional members to the Early Learning Advisory Council (ELAC)
  - HB – Healthiest Next Generation
  - HB 2277 – Improve quality in early education
  - HB 2598 – Introduced by Representative Ruth Kagi; by request of Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI):

An act relating to clarifying the lead agency for the early support for infants and toddlers program; and amending RCW 28A.155.065.

Sec. 1. RCW 28A.155.065 and 2007 c 115 s 7 are each amended to read as follows:

(1) By September 1, 2009, each school district shall provide or contract for early intervention services to all eligible children with disabilities from birth to three years of age. Eligibility shall be determined according to Part C of the federal individuals with disabilities education ((improvement)) act or other applicable federal and state laws, and as specified in the Washington Administrative Code adopted by the state lead agency, which is the department of early learning. School districts shall provide or contract, or both, for early intervention services in partnership with local birth-to-three lead agencies and birth-to-three providers. Services provided under this section shall not supplant services or funding currently provided in the state for early intervention services or funding currently provided in the state for early intervention services to eligible children with disabilities from birth to three years of age. The state-designated birth-to-three lead agency shall be payor of last resort for birth-to-three early intervention services provided under this section.

(2) The services in this section are not part of the state's program of basic education pursuant to Article IX of the state Constitution.

- Farewell

Kelli has accepted the position of Deputy Director of Child Care Aware of Washington. Kelli started in DEL in 2007 leading the Head Start State Collaboration Office before moving into her role as Assistant Director for the Partnerships and Collaboration division. In this role, she guided the successful transition of several important programs to DEL that included Early Support for Infants and Toddlers (ESIT), Medicaid Treatment Child Care (MTCC), and Strengthening Families Washington. She has led other important efforts that include DEL's partnership with Thrive by Five Washington in making home visiting services available to vulnerable families, moving forward the work of the Early Learning Advisory Council (ELAC), and directly engaging with the State Interagency Coordinating Council (SICC).

Kelli's many skills, abilities and leadership will be especially missed by the Early Support for Infants and Toddlers (ESIT) program: her experience working in local programs; her passion for ensuring all children – including the most vulnerable – have access to needed programs and services; and her strong belief that partnerships with other state and local stakeholders are essential for getting the work of early learning system-building done.

### **III. Office of the Insurance Commission (OIC) – Presentation**

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Wendy Galloway, Compliance Analyst gave an update and presentation to the Council on the Office of the Insurance Commissioner (OIC).

    - Includes Qualified health Plans (QHPs) with additional oversight by WA Health Benefit Exchange (HBE)
    - Includes Medicare Supplement plans
  - Does not generally regulate
    - Self-insured or self-funded plans (regulated by federal law) (a type of job-based health insurance coverage, where the *employer* pays the claims with its own funds)
    - Health care providers (Dept. of Health)
    - Medicare A and B, D, Medicare Advantage, Medicaid Apple Health (Center for Medicaid and Medicare)
- Health Care Reform
  - Law signed March 2010
  - Goals: Expand health care coverage to 32 million uninsured Americans and slow down the rising cost of health care
  - Changes:
    - Financial assistance through Washington Healthplanfinder (aka Exchange or marketplace)
    - No annual or lifetime limits on healthcare
    - Can't deny coverage due to pre-existing conditions
    - Quickly appeal any health insurance company decision
    - Easy-to-understand summary of benefits and coverage
    - Young adults can stay on parents plan until age 26
    - New preventative services at no out-of-pocket cost
    - Can't be charged more based on health status or gender
  - Essential Health Benefits (See [WAC 284.43.878](#))
    - Ambulatory patient services
    - Emergency services
    - Hospitalization
    - Maternity and newborn care
    - Mental health and treatment of substance abuse disorders, including behavioral health treatment
    - Prescription drugs

***Department of Health, Children with Special Health Care Needs, Maria Nardella***  
Highlights:

- There are a number of employment opportunities in the Access, Systems, and Coordination Section, with more about to open specifically in the Healthy Starts and Transitions unit that includes the CSHCN program. - K01-Medicaid: If a child (up to age 19) is in a hospital or care facility continuously for 30 days or longer, the family is probably eligible for the long term medical program (K01 Medicaid), because the parent income is not considered. **Office of the Insurance Commissioner**, Wendy Galloway  
Highlights:

- In 2013, the OIC Consumer Advocacy Division helped recover 8.4 million in insurance billings, refunds and other claims-related issues for Washington consumers.

- The OIC continues to educate consumers about health care reform and help them find health coverage. They continue to receive calls from frustrated consumers who are having technical difficulties with the Exchange's online application process.
- Washington State's individual health insurance market – both inside and outside Washington Healthplanfinder (Exchange) is projected to have over 300,000 people signed up by March 31, 2014, according to information reported by health insurers and figures provided by the Exchange.
- Open enrollment for purchasing individual and family health coverage ends March 31, 2014.
  - Apple Health (Medicaid) enrollment is year round

**Health Care Authority, Chris Bess**

Highlights:

- The Health Care Authority (HCA) is currently working in collaboration with the Department of Early Learning (DEL) on two projects:
  - HCA is awaiting approval from our budget office and OFM for state money to support the inclusion of Part C services in the schools. In our initial planning, the early intervention (EI) services covered in the schools will be OT/PT and Speech. This work will require a Medicaid state plan amendment which will take approximately one year to accomplish. An approved state plan is required before HCA can implement a new program or services. The EI services will be included under the Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis and Treatment (EPSDT) benefit. DEL is/will be at the table as we work through writing the state plan amendment and negotiating with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) for their approval.   - HCA is working closely with DEL staff on a state plan amendment to include the Medicaid Treatment Child Care Program (MTCC) under the EPSDT benefit in the State plan. Our goal is to make this a statewide program for children birth to five who are suffering from abuse and/or neglect. Again, this process will take approximately one year; will require CMS approval and state funds to finance the program. DEL will be at the table as we negotiate a new structure for the MTCC program and will be actively involved in developing the amendment to the state plan. Approval for the amendment will require our budget office approval as well as the Office of Financial Management (OFM). **DSHS – Developmental Disabilities Administration, Kris Pederson**

Highlights:

- SB 6387 and HB 2432, if passed, will provide an opportunity to move the Individual and Family Services state funded program into a Home and Community based waiver program. The Senate bill also allows for a provision to add 1000 people to the Basic Plus waiver.
- SB 6387, if passed, will require DSHS to implement a Medicaid waiver to replace the Individual and Family Services (IFS) program – no later than May 30, 2015.
  - It grants DSHS the authority to increase the number of clients served, within the new IFS waiver, to the extent possible within existing funds.
  - Includes a statement of legislative intent that if additional federal funds are attained through the Community First Choice Option, then by June 30, 2017 at least 4000

- individuals will receive services within the IFS waiver, and an additional 1000 will receive services under the existing Basic Plus waiver.
- HB 2432, if passed, will require DDA to identify stakeholders to participate in workgroups, at their expense, and report to the appropriate Legislative committee on issues raised by July 31, 2013.
    - State Auditor's Developmental Disabilities Program Evaluation is required by January 1, 2015.
    - Requires DSHS to implement a Medicaid program to replace the Individual and Family Services (IFS) program by May 1, 2016.
  - SHB 2363, if passed, will allow dependents of military service members to retain eligibility for developmental disability services while living out of state due to military assignment.
  - The Centers for Medicaid and Medicare services has released a new Home and Community Based Service CFR. The service delivery must be based on person-centered planning and services options to embrace the qualities of integration. ## V. Committee Updates

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### **Family Leadership and Involvement Committee (FLIC)**, Amy Kocher

#### Highlights:

- Committee will meet tomorrow, February 27.
- Members of the Committee will meet with Legislators, February 27, and have an appointment to meet with the Lieutenant Governor.
- The WEECARE Coalition has developed a mission statement: To support advocacy for infants and toddlers with disabilities and their need for stable and equitable funding in Washington State. The purpose of the group is to advocate for public policy that supports this population and their families statewide.
- Shared a book, "Becoming Citizens" by Suzanne Schwartzberg. Includes a photo of Cecile Lindquist with former Governor Booth Gardner.
- Sugely Sanchez shared a resource folder that the Developmental Disabilities Administration has put together, based on a model borrowed from Wisconsin. Resources include information for birth through life.
- Debbie Jackson shared information on the Infant and Early Childhood Conference (IECC) in Tacoma, May 7-9, 2014. One of the Keynotes will be a panel of people who will share their experiences. Mrs. Trudi Inslee will be a panel member.

### **Data Committee**, Kathy Fortner

### **Funding Committee**, Karen Walker

#### Highlights:

- ESIT is waiting for final confirmation of its annual Federal allocation.
- Sequestration will not affect the Federal Part C allocation for the next contract period.
- Washington anticipates receiving a small increase based on birth rate
- ESIT continues to review day in time and cumulative child count data
- Must continue to assure Part C funds supplement, not supplant, state and local public funding
  - Variation in public funding persists across the state

- Primary funding for early intervention services are administered through other state agencies; other agency requirements must be met in order to access these funds
- Federal Part C funds are not used to fund direct services (unless payor of last resort) but rather fund the infrastructure that is necessary to ensure services are provided and coordinated at the local level (FRCs and LLA administrators).
- To prepare for reporting maintenance of effort financial data, ESIT will require LLAs to submit public early intervention revenue data starting in FFY 14

**Public Policy**, Debbie Jackson

Highlights:

- Cecile Lindquist held a meeting with members of the WEECARE coalition. Discussion topics included messaging, outreach to legislators.
- Darci Ladwig, FLIC member, has created website and Facebook page for WEECARE. This will serve as a way to communicate any “actions” items and updates related to the Wee Care coalition members as well as a way to make members aware of any legislation or related issues that concern our population.

**Personnel and Training**, Janet Spybrook

Highlights:

- The committee sent out a recruitment retention survey and received 57 responses. This is a good response rate of all provider agencies across the state and a fairly representative sample.
- Preliminary review shows confirmation of issues our providers have been telling us. For example, shortages of our core service providers continue but positions usually can be filled fairly quickly.
- There is still a need for pre-service training of specialty providers such as ABA specialists, Vision and Mobility specialists, Infant Mental health Specialists.
- There is a big need for training in working with very young children and their families and a very big need for training in working with diverse cultures.
- The Committee will continue to analyze, ask more questions and reach out to higher education regarding pre-service training needs.
- This data helps to justify need when applying for federal and other training grants and will assist in our SSIP infrastructure analysis.

## VI. **ESIT Update**

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Karen Walker and ESIT staff provided updates.

Highlights:

- ESIT will welcome a new Program Consultant, Debra Donelan, MSSA, LISW-S, EIS, on March 17. Debi is leaving her position as a Developmental Specialist in Ohio. She has seven years' experience providing early intervention services. She is familiar with the IFSP process, understands the importance of using evidence based practices, and is able to provide training on a variety of early intervention topics in diverse contexts.
- The Annual Performance Report (APR) has been submitted to the Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP). ESIT will apply for FFY 2014 funding in April, 2014. As part of the application process, ESIT is required to hold a public comment period prior to each year's application submission. The 60 day public comment period, prior to submitting the application, will be held Feb/March, 2014.

- ESIT General Supervision and Monitoring:
  - Future focus of federal monitoring is shifting to a new accountability framework, described as “Results Driven Accountability” (RDA). The new accountability structure will focus on improving functional child and family outcomes. OSEP believes that in order to fulfill the IDEA’s requirements, a more balanced approach to supporting program effectiveness in early intervention and special education is necessary.
  - OSEP has added a new indicator to the Annual Performance Plan that requires states to develop a State Systemic Improvement Plan (SSIP).
  - ESIT is receiving national technical assistance from the Western Regional Resource Center (WRRC) as Washington’s phased-in SSIP is developed. Phase 1 will include data analysis, identification of the focus for improvement, identification of infrastructure needed to support improvement and build capacity, and the development of a Theory of Action that will lead to improved results for children and families.
- ESIT is gearing up for the next annual compliance data collection/monitoring process. Data Management System (DMS) census monitoring data from the period January - March 2014 will be taken the end of April 2014. If any non-compliance is identified through this process, findings of noncompliance will be made and letters issued to LLAs in July 2014.
- Work continues on the development of WAC for the ESIT program. The WAC will govern the provision of IDEA, Part C early intervention services for eligible infants and toddlers in Washington. Stakeholder meetings and webinars have been held to provide recommendations on:
  - The structure, order and format of the draft WAC
  - Local training and technical assistance needs
  - Development of a distribution and communication plan
  - Identification of challenges and opportunities of implementing the WAC

ESIT will hold public hearings in the spring of 2014. A webinar format will continue to be used to facilitate broad statewide participation in the public hearings and accept comments before adopting permanent rules.

ESIT will coordinate the development of these rules, as appropriate, with the state Department of Health, Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction, Department of Social and Health Services, and the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Special Education Programs.

- Basic FRC training now begins with completion of IDEA, Part C and DMS online training modules. Once online modules are completed, new FRCs select at least two of four in-person trainings to attend during their first year of employment. The next trainings are March 18<sup>th</sup> and June 3<sup>rd</sup> at ESD locations throughout the state. The January 15<sup>th</sup> topic was **Leading the Team and Evaluation and Assessment**. Interested individuals may participate in more than two in-person trainings, as space allows. Year 2 FRC training was held on February 15<sup>th</sup>, via the K-20 video system.
- The annual Infant and Early Childhood Conference will be held on May 7, 8 and 9 at the Tacoma Convention Center. Online registration opened February 1, 2014.
  - Each year ESIT provides scholarships for parents of children 0-5, who have participated in early intervention, to attend the conference.
