

American Academy of Pediatrics "What's the Latest With the Flu" Message for Child Care Providers

2016-2017 Influenza Season

<u>Flu</u> activity is elevated in the United States, as is expected at this time of year. The single best way to protect against influenza and reduce the risk of becoming sick from it is to get vaccinated. Influenza vaccine is recommended for everyone 6 months of age and older, including child care staff. It is recommended that everyone get vaccinated NOW, if you have not already received it this season. Vaccination of every person in a child care setting is an incredibly valuable step in protecting the public's health.

Misconceptions about the Flu Vaccine

A number of misconceptions about the flu vaccine have emerged over the years, causing some to avoid vaccination. Below you will find important information to clear up these mistaken ideas.

- While some people may experience mild side effects within a day of receiving the influenza vaccine, it never causes the flu.
- How well the flu vaccine works may change from year-to-year, but in general, the
 vaccine cuts the risk of flu illness and flu hospitalizations by at least half. Every year, flu
 vaccines prevent millions of illnesses and hundreds of thousands of hospitalizations.
- This year, the flu vaccine is a very good match with the exact influenza viruses circulating in communities.
- Flu vaccines are safe for pregnant women. A flu vaccine can protect a pregnant women from flu AND protect har behy for soveral months after high

 It takes 2 weeks for flu vaccine protection to begin, so it is important to get vaccinated as soon as possible.

Certificate of Immunization Status Changes

A new hard copy Certificate of Immunization Status (CIS) dated Jan. 2017 has been posted here. Some reminders:

- Please use the new CIS for all new children
- Previous versions of the CIS are still valid
- There is no requirement to transfer immunizations from an old CIS to the new CIS
- There is no requirement to get a CIS from children each year
- My Immunization Record (MyIR) that parents access is still generating the old version. This CIS is valid and can be accepted

The Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction's (OSPI) Child Nutrition Services section encourages eligible nonresidential licensed child-care centers, family day-care homes, emergency shelters, at-risk centers and some adult day care centers in Washington to participate in the federal Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP). 
Intended users are school administrators and nurses; preschool staff; and child care staff or administrators. Please feel free to forward this toolkit to other who may benefit from having it.
